# What to Expect After Your Pet's Vaccination

It is common for pets to experience some or all of the following mild side effects after receiving a vaccine, usually starting within hours of the vaccination. If these side effects last for more than a day or two, or cause your pet significant discomfort, it is important for you to contact your veterinarian:

-Discomfort and local swelling at the vaccination site -Mild fever -Decreased activity -Decreased appetite -Sneezing, mild coughing, snotty nose or other respiratory signs may occur 2-5 days after an intranasal vaccine

More serious, but less common side effects, such as allergic reactions, may occur within minutes to hours after vaccination. These reactions can be life-threatening and are medical emergencies.

-Persistent vomiting or diarrhea -Hives -Swelling of the face -Severe coughing or difficulty breathing -Collapse

A small, firm swelling under the skin may develop at the site of a recent vaccination. It should start to disappear within a couple weeks. If it persists more than 3 weeks, or seems to be getting larger, you should contact your veterinarian. Always inform your veterinarian if your pet has had prior reactions to any vaccine or medication. If in doubt, wait 30-60 minutes following vaccination before taking your pet home.

# The Five M's of Downer Cows

Downer cow syndrome results in a cow laying down and unable to stand. There are many causes of downer cow syndrome, with more prevalence in dairy cows after calving.

- 1. Metabolic Diseases: Milk fever, nervous ketosis, others
- 2. Metritis: A toxic infection of the uterus following calving
  - 3. Mastitis: Coliform mastitis or sometimes Staph. aureus
- 4. **Musculoskeletal/neurologic Injury**: Calving paralysis, bone fractures, etc.
- 5. **Massive Peritonitis**: Infection in the abdomen; Ruptured abomasal ulcer, hardware disease, full-thickness uterine tear, intestinal accident

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
